Cinzia Milani will perform on Saturday, March 23, 2024.

On the evening of Saturday, March 23, Cinzia Milani will grace the stage at Sundin Music Hall. Milani has a diversified career as a guitarist, violinist, dancer, and singer. Her concert career began in Italy at the age of 12 when she performed on guitar in the United Kingdom, France, Spain, the United States, Canada, Mexico, South Africa, Indonesia, and South America. Her guitar performances have repeatedly caught the attention of the British and American press which have defined her as "a rare combination of beauty, grace, natural elegance..." and as having "a deep sense of music with a brilliant technique and a powerful sound and expression, considered among the best exponents of the concert artists in the world...". In addition to touring, Milani taught masterclasses at Royal Conservatory of Toronto and released CDs -ATribute to Teresa de Rogatis in 2019 and A Tribwith the Brilliant Classics label. In addition to her career as a guitarist, Milani has played the violin with orchestras in Italy, Spain, and France. She performed as a guitarist, and also as a dancer and singer, in the Argentinian show Sonatango, and recorded the CD Sonatango. Milani also created the show Venere, about the feminine universe told through music and dance. Venere consists of music composed

won the Guitar Foundation of America's International Concert Artist Competition. This prestigious GFA Competition is known for drawing the most talented competitors from around the world, and winning the competition is a coveted milestone in the careers of many young musicians. He is regarded as one of the leading guitarists of the younger generation. In addition to this GFA win in 2022, Peretić has won more than 30 other prizes in international competitions, including the Eurostrings Guitar Competition, arguably the biggest competition for guitar in Europe, which brought him an opportunity to give numerous concerts and master classes in 18 European countries. He regularly performs in various chamber music groups, including the guitar trio Evocación, which recently released its first album. As a solo artist, Peretić has per-

Young Guitarists Prepare for Summer Competitions

Whether artistic or athletic, training for a high-level competition takes incredible commitment and determination. Just ask Soren Winikoff, a Twin Cities high school student, and Sage Kuphal, a local, home-schooled tween, who are preparing for a summer of classical guitar competitions.

Last year Winikoff competed at the James Stroud Classical Guitar Competition in Cleveland and the Guitar Foundation of America's International Youth Competition (IYC) in New York City. In 2022, the Schubert Club competition awarded him Honorable Mention for his first ever competitive performance. In 2024, Winikoff plans to compete in either the Guitar Foundation of America's IYC at Cal State Fullerton, or the Stroud competition in Cleveland, as well as the Schubert Club competition at Macalester College in St. Paul. As always, he will play a guitar that was custommade by Christopher Dean for a guitarist's Carnegie Hall debut and later sold.

"It was amazing competing at the GFA in New York last summer although, unfortunately, I wasn't able to stay for the conference. Still, walking around, seeing or meeting classical guitarists and composers, was incredible! The highlight for me was meeting Jérémy Jouve in the hotel lobby," he says, later adding that he has done masterclasses with Jouve and Cuban-born René Izquierdo

through the MGS and the University of Minnesota respectively.

When asked about the expense of competing, Winikoff says that he doesn't have any sponsors yet, but "If you make it through the first round of competition, which is a video submission, Stroud provides you with airfare to Cleveland. The GFA doesn't offer anything like that, so that definitely makes Stroud an attractive choice for next summer."

For the past three years Winikoff has been training with his teacher, Alan Johnston, at Mac-Phail Center for Music. He got his start on a ukulele at the age of four after his parents found him pretending to strum his sister's cardboard violin upside-down. In addition to taking lessons with Johnston, Winikoff says he practices for an hour during his first period 'spare' at

school, and for another hour at home in the evening. His favorite composer to practice is

Leo Bower of Cuba.
He participates in and practices with the MacPhail Guitar
Quartet, which Johnston oversees, and has been featured on NPR's "From the Top," a podcast about up-and-coming young classical musicians.

In addition to playing classical music, Winikoff is a competitive Nordic and crosscountry skier, is in his

second year of debate club, and occasionally jams on his classical guitar with school friends.

"We got to play at a school event once – campfire songs and sing-alongs – which was really fun!" he adds.

While Winikoff is unsure what the future will bring, he is grateful for the opportunities he currently enjoys.

"I can't thank Alan Johnston enough for being so supportive, giving so much of his time to me and to the quartet," he says. "And I really appreciate my parents' sacrifices, and for flying me around."

Meanwhile, in another part of the Twin Cities, 12 year-old Sage Kuphal is also decid-

ing which classical guitar competitions to enter. In the longer term, Kuphal says he hopes that someday his guitar skills might earn him a college scholarship, a very valid and worthwhile goal.

Kuphal currently takes online lessons with Kevin Carlson (who recently relocated to Arizona) and practices for at least 30 minutes per day. He got his start at the age of five while living in West Virginia. His father began teaching him, but he soon got a formal guitar teacher who made Kuphal really love the instrument.

"I learned to play on Dad's guitar, but it was really big for me, of course," he

Kuphal plays an acoustic guitar by Gringo Starr, made in Mexico, and says he favors compositions by Jerry Reed and Jorge Morel. He also plays a Fender electric and a Taylor GS mini guitar, and loves "'70s music, but especially the Beatles, Beach Boys, and Led Zeppelin."

"I like playing Spanish and the faster jazz music best," says Kuphal.
"It's really fun and challenging."

When Kuphal isn't preparing to compete, he does tae kwon do, plays soccer, and enjoys playing board games.

Artistic Director Joseph Hagedorn Can (and Does) Really Pick Them!





Joseph Hagedorn is a guitarist, teacher, and the MGS's artistic director.

Joe Hagedorn has been on the board of the MGS since its inception in 1984. In 1992, when the MGS started to seek grant funding to bring in performers from outside Minnesota, he acquired the job of booking the coming year's International Artists Series (IAS) concerts and eventually acquired the title 'artistic director' to go with it.

"When the MGS first got started we didn,'t book very many concerts. We had

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everything does fall into

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guitarathons and we featured mostly local performers — and they were very good. Then, in 1992, we started the IAS with four concerts per season, and it has grown from there," he explains.

As the MGS's artistic director, Hagedorn spends his winters planning and coordinating the coming concert season while working

with the artists that were contracted to perform during the current season.

Hagedorn says the whole process starts with a list.

"I get names of potential performers from others who are plugged into the classical guitar community, including people on our board of directors. And I'm always watching who's going on tour in the U.S., and who's doing well at the various international guitar competitions. It used to be that I got tons of mail from guitarists asking to perform for us, sending me demo CDs and so on.

Nowadays I get emails from guitarists that contain links to performances that I can watch online. It saves them an awful lot of time and money."

Next, Hagedorn determines whether the fee charged by the performers of interest make financial sense in Sundin Music Hall, a venue with a 325 seat capacity. If the artists seem affordable, he asks them how a show in the Twin Cities might fit into their tour schedule. As he weighs his options, he tries to build variety into the IAS

season, ideally balancing emerging and experienced performers, soloists, and ensembles, and occasionally non-classical or even non-guitar artists. And all the while, Hagedorn keeps close tabs on who is being booked by the other arts organizations in the Twin Cities, like the Guthrie Theater, while minding the availability of Sundin Music Hall.

"For the first season we held our concerts in Whitney Theater at the Minneapolis

Community & Technical
College on Hennepin Avenue.
Then we moved the concerts
for about five years to
the College of St. Thomas,
before it became a
university. And finally, we
settled on Sundin Music Hall,
where we have remained for
many, many seasons. It seats
325, which is small enough
that the concerts have an

intimate feel with wonderful acoustics," he says. "In fact, sometimes the guitarist's managers don't believe me when I tell them that they don't need a big sound system to be heard. You can hear a guitar soloist just fine, anywhere in the hall."

Hagedorn says the biggest hurdle in booking guitarists from outside the U.S. is

usually the expensive and time-consuming process of applying for a work visa that entitles them to perform. Although there are some guitarists who can navigate through the red tape on their own (like Jérémy Jouve, for example), Hagedorn has learned that those with management in the U.S. usually have this complex paperwork handled for them, correctly and on time.

"There definitely are risks involved for both parties," he explains. "For the performer there's the chance that they could fall ill or get hurt and be unable to perform. For us, we book the venue and the guitarist, but what if their work visa is delayed? And even if everything does fall into place, will we get a good audience?"

It's a risky business, but Hagedorn has had decades of experience booking artists from all over the world, and keeping members and friends of the MGS coming back for more IAS concerts.

"I never cease to be amazed by the new, high caliber performers who come onto the scene year after year. The world is full of such talented young people! If only it was easier to get them here and onto our stage!" he says with a chuckle. "Seriously, I love what I do for MGS. It is rewarding and also a lot of fun."

In addition to his volunteer position as the MGS's artistic director, Hagedorn has taught Applied Guitar, Class Guitar and directed the Guitar Ensemble at the University of Wisconsin-River Falls since 1988. Since his career was launched by winning the 1990 Guitar Foundation of America solo competition, he has enjoyed a fulfilling performing career as a soloist and chamber musician. In 1986 he joined the Minneapolis Guitar Quartet as one of the original members.

Hagedorn, who earned the Bachelor of Music degree at Cornell College and the Master of Music from the University of Minnesota, has one daughter and lives in Minneapolis with his wife, violinist Leslie Shank.

MGS Members Celebrate 40 Years of Music and Memories



The room was packed and abuzz with talk and laughter as members and friends of the MGS gathered to celebrate 40 years of music and memories. On the evening of Tuesday, January 30, young and old gathered to share stories, hear performances, and express their hopes to return in 10 years to celebrate the MGS at 50.

Highlights of the evening included special performances by long-time MGS volunteer Gene Swanson, past-president and *Guitarist* founder Steve Haskin, and MGS founder and past-president Tony Hauser.

Gene Swanson was the first to grace the stage and played numerous original classical pieces as well as some jazz selections.

Steve Haskin, who drove all the way from Austin, Texas to attend the party, performed with his old friends Terry Storhaug and vocalist Liz Pauly. After giving a short speech about the early days of the society, he played several bossa nova favorites followed by a few original songs.

Last but not least, Tony Hauser spoke about previous guitar organizations, founding the MGS, and filing for non-profit status before commanding the room with his classical and flamenco interpretations. He closed by encouraging the guitarists in the audience to visit his website, where he has made many of his arrangements and original compositions freely available (www.tonyhauser.com).

In addition to the performances, guests enjoyed a display that showed who had performed at MGS concerts over the years, and where in the world they had come from. Two bound sets of *Guitarist* back issues circulated the room, and the walls were hung with t-shirts that the society had printed in years gone by, listing the year's International Artists Series performers.

Preparations Underway for Youth Guitarathon

With spring in the air, the MGS has begun preparing for our next Youth Guitarathon, which will take place on Saturday, May 18 at 7:00 pm in Sundin Music Hall.

The goal of the Youth Guitarathon is to nurture and encourage young guitarists of various styles and ages (6 to 21), at a variety of levels, either solo or in an ensemble. Performers will be chosen at an audition that will take place on Saturday, April 20 in the Brady Center at the University of St Thomas. Applications for auditions must be received

by March 31. The form can be found on the MGS website under the Education tab.

Auditions for the Youth Guitarathon will be heard by a panel of experienced judges who are guitarists from various backgrounds. Criteria for the selection of soloists and ensembles will be based on musicianship, skill level, stage presence, and diversity of style. All guitarists who audition will receive a comment sheet from the judges providing valuable, positive feedback.

The Youth Guitarathon was held annually

from 2007 to 2012, and relaunched in the 2022/23 season when funding became available. For the 2023/24 season, we have scheduled the concert in springtime to better coincide with the school year and allow the students adequate preparation time. We are grateful to our sponsors, the Augustine and D'Addario foundations, for making this event possible, and to our vice president, Annett Richter, for managing this season's event.
